RE: APIQR ISO 14001:2015 TRANSITION PROCESS

As you may be aware, ISO 14001:2015 was published on September 15, 2015. As a result, APIQR and other third-party certification bodies are required to transition their ISO 14001 registered facilities to the new version within three years of the September 15, 2015 publication date, meaning not later than September 15, 2018.

The ANSI-ASQ National Accreditation Board (ANAB), our accreditation body for Quality Management System (QMS) and Environmental Management System (EMS) certification, requires that APIQR must transition first. Once completed, we will begin conducting certification audits based on the revised standard.

Given these requirements and to be well-prepared for an effective transition, please note the following:

1. All ISO 14001:2004 certificates issued after September 15, 2015 as a result of an initial or recertification audit will have an expiration date of September 15, 2018. Please note that **ISO 14001:2004 certificates will no longer be valid after September 15, 2018.**
2. Once your organization has successfully transitioned to the new ISO 14001:2015 edition and APIQR has verified this with an audit, your 14001 certificate will be reissued with reference to the 2015 version and will have an expiration date that is consistent with the start date of the current certification cycle.
3. **All audits scheduled on or after September 1, 2016** shall be based on the requirements of **ISO 14001:2015**. We strongly recommend that you immediately review your EMS and begin making the required changes. Doing so now will help ensure that existing APIQR-registered and applicant organizations are ready to be audited by this date.
